Conference Theme

In the Asian Pacific Region, most countries are experiencing unprecedentedly rapid urbanization which brings about quantitative and qualitative changes in the urban realm, while more developed Oceania countries also facing new challenges of urbanization such as the influx of overseas investment and migration. The advent of a new epoch of urbanization in the region projects profound influence on a number of housing issues, which brings both new challenges such as severe problems of housing affordability and housing security, and new opportunities such as green housing and healthy living. It is therefore a high time to revisit some classical housing issues such as affordable housing policies, residential mobility, social mix and residential differentiation under the new circumstances, while inquire into some emerging housing issues in the region, e.g. global investment and housing market stability, financialization of housing market, and post-financial crisis housing security. This APNHR conference will bring scholars from various contexts to discuss the common challenges and opportunities we are facing, and generate a synergy to devise better solutions and envisage a brighter future for housing development in the region.

2016 APNHR Conference Housing Issues in a New Epoch of Urbanization: Challenges and Opportunities

The 8th APNHR Conference was held at Sun Yat-sen University, Guangzhou, China from 17th to 19th December 2016. This conference attracted over 150 participants from 24 different countries and regions across six continents. This conference hosted 19 sessions and over 90 oral presentations covering broad and topical themes, such as high-density living, elderly housing, green housing and healthy living, residential mobility and big data in housing research.

The 8th APNHR Conference was co-organized by the Centre of Urban Studies and Urban Planning, The University of Hong Kong and the Department of Urban and Regional Planning, Sun Yat-sen University. Guangdong Real Estate Association was the supporting organization. Dr. Shenjing He from the University of Hong Kong was the conference chair, while Prof. Yungang Liu from Sun Yat-sen University and Prof. Jie Chen of Shanghai University of Finance and Economics were vice conference chairs.



This conference invited six well-established scholars, practitioners and policymakers to deliver keynote speeches. Keynote speakers included Mr. Jun Feng (the Vice Director and Secretary-general of the China Real Estate Association), Prof. Chris Webster (Dean of the Faculty of Architecture, The University of Hong Kong), Prof. Edward G. Goetz (the Director of the Center for Urban and Regional Affairs at the University of Minnesota), Prof. Yosuke Hirayama (Professor of Housing and Urban Studies at Kobe University), Prof. Siqi Zheng (the Director of Hang Lung Center for Real Estate at Tsinghua University) and Prof. Rachelle Alterman (the Head of the Lab on Comparative Planning Law and Land Policy at the Technion – Israel Institute of Technology).

Convened by Prof. Rebecca L. H. Chiu (the Director of the Centre of Urban Studies and Urban Planning, The University of Hong Kong), a roundtable discussion themed 'Gated Communities – Controversial to Whom?' was organized, with Prof. Rebecca L. H. Chiu, Prof. Edward G. Goetz, Prof. Rachelle Alterman, Prof. Chris Webster and Dr. Wan Nor Azriyati Wan Aziz as panel members.

During the conference, the organizing committee also arranged fieldtrip to one affordable housing estate (Fanghe Garden) and one commercial housing estate (Evergrande Royal Peninsula) on 17th December. Some overseas participants visited UNESCO World Heritage Site- Kaiping Barbican and Villages on 19th December.

Roundtable discussion

Gated communities – controversial to whom?

Gated communities are outcomes of housing consumers' pursuit for safety, self-contained neigbourhoods, prestigious and exclusive lifestyle, and asset protection. They are also corollaries of developers' pursuit of better marketability and profitability through advocating and selling lifestyles which shape, and are simultaneously led by, consumers' preference. They could also be regarded as consequences of government's intention to maximize land utility and public revenue and to minimize spending on neighbourhood security and facilities, while at times, they are also intended outcomes of government's land, housing, planning and spatial policies.

They are often accused of being causes of enclave urbanism and socio-spatial segregation, legal or illegal privatization of public space, and urban ills – traffic congestion, poor air quality, alienation, and etc. They are thus topics of academic debates in relation to: urban planning and land management; property rights; public, private, and club realms; common pool resources management; urban governance especially state role in private properties; local socio-spatial development and wellbeing; commodification of public space and lifestyle. This roundtable discussion will grapple with the following issues:

- 1. In the context of rapid urbanization, is high-rise gated community development an efficient, equitable and necessary approach to provide livable homes and environments to middle-income groups by the market, and to the low-income groups by the government?
- 2. Despite housing consumers' preference, social scientists' criticisms of gated communities are often value-laden and theory-loaded what are the legitimate grounds for these criticisms, apart from "for the sake of public interests"?
- 3. What is the role of the state in actual empirical cases of private gated community development and management; and how property rights are affected and re-interpreted?
- 4. Gated communities partially shape lifestyle, and relatedly individual and community wellbeing (e.g. personal health and public health). Are governments legitimate to enact and enforce laws to control the planning, design and management of private gated communities to ensure individual and community wellbeing?


